It is important that we pause and acknowledge these outstanding articles and their authors. In addition, we recognize the outstanding service of John A. We have four peer-reviewed feature articles in this issue that are indicative of the breadth of interests of professional appraisers. Our cover article, "Golf Course Design and Real Estate Values: The Impact of Cart Paths on Condominium Prices," looks at how the placement of golf cart paths near condominiums may affect the sale prices of these residential units.
